
Who We Are

The Marine Patrol is a unit of the Department of Safety, Division of State Police, and is the primary agency responsible for enforcing New Hampshire's boating laws.



Who We Are

The unit is comprised of full-time & part-time officers dedicated to promoting and ensuring safe boating upon New Hampshire's public waters.

Types of Marine Patrol Officer Assignments

There are two types of MP Officer Assignments:

Field Officer – This officer is issued a 16' boat and trailer and is assigned to a county or counties. They tow the State vessel behind their personal vehicle and are reimbursed for their mileage.

Stationary/Fixed Officer – This officer is assigned to a body of water where a boat is kept at a dock for the season (i.e. Winnipesaukee, Winnisquam, Newfound, Squam, Coast, etc.).





What We Do

- Enforcement of State boating laws
- Enforcement of State criminal laws
- Investigation of all boating accidents and drownings



What We Do

- Installation and maintenance of approximately 3,000 marine navigational aids
- Inspection of commercial vessels
- Testing of commercial vessel operators
- Providing security on the seacoast




Where We Operate

Marine Patrol has enforcement authority on all public bodies of water having 10 or more acres, including lakes, ponds, rivers, and the ocean.



When We Operate

The Marine Patrol operates 365 days per year, with the primary operational period running from May through October.




When We Operate

Patrols are conducted in all weather and water conditions, and at all times of the day or night, depending upon enforcement requirements.



Helpful Information

Many lakefront homeowners do not include house numbers on the waterfront side of their residence. It is helpful for property owners to add their house number so it can also been seen from the water in the event of an emergency.



Helpful Information...Boats

When calling to report a violation or boating emergency, if possible provide a description of the boat including:

- Bow Number if visible
- Make
- Color(s)
- Style
- Canvas / Bimini Top & Color
- Number People on Board
- Description of operator/people
- Last known direction of travel



Frequent Boating Violations

Safe Passage violations – operating above headway speed when within 150 feet of other vessels, shore, swimmers, docks, etc.


Water ski law violations - towing more than 2 persons on skis, not enough observers, etc.

Unregistered boat violations / improper display violations



Frequent Boating Violations (cont.)

- -Lighting violations
- -Operating without a valid boater education certificate
- -Careless and Negligent Operation
- -Boating While Intoxicated



Frequent Violations (cont.)


Boating While Intoxicated minimum penalties (1st offense)


- Class B Misdemeanor
- \$500 fine
- 9 month loss of driver's license, 6 months suspended if they follow provisions outlined in the statute
- 1 year loss of boating privileges



There are a few specific areas on waterways where rafting is restricted.

In rafting restricted areas, boaters must anchor their vessels at set distances from shore and other boats.

PART Saf-C RAFTING RULES

(a) In addition to and in conjunction with the requirements of RSA 270:44, no person, except as otherwise provided herein, shall, in a prohibited location or at a prohibited time:

(1) Form or allow a boat which he or she is operating or in charge of to be a member of a raft consisting of 3 or more boats;

(2) Form or allow the boat which he or she is operating or in charge of to be a member of a raft if any part of such raft is:

a. Less than 150 feet from shore; (75 feet in the case of Braun Bay, Lake Winnipesaukee) or

b. Less than 50 feet from any other raft; or


c. Less than 50 feet from any occupied single boat which is stationary upon the waters of the same lake or pond; and

(3) Anchor a single boat and cause it to remain stationary upon the waters of a lake or pond other than momentarily if any part of such boat is:

a. Less than 150 feet from shore; or

b. Less than 50 feet away from any raft; or

c. Less than 25 feet away from any other single boat which is stationary upon the waters of such lake or pond.



Boating Accidents

By law, a boating accident must be reported when it meets any of the following criteria:

- •\$2,000 or greater combined property damage
- missing person
- •personal injury
- death



Boating Accidents

- Falls from boat
- Leaving boat for object that flew out of boat
- Sinking/capsizing/swamping
- Grounding
- Injuries while underway
- Fires/explosions

Boating Education

NH law requires anyone operating a boat with an engine greater than 25 Hp to have proof of valid boating education on board.


When MPOs stop a vessel, they will check for BE in addition to asking for the operator's ID and vessel registration.



Boating Education


Certificates accepted include:

- Issued by NH (1996 or later)
- NH temporary certificate (not expired)
- NH commercial boat operator license (not expired)
- Out of state certificate issued by the state <u>and</u> NASBLA approved
- U.S. Power Squadron certificate
- U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary certificate
- Federally issued commercial boating license



Navigational Aids

All of the inland navigational aids throughout the state are built in-house. They are all deployed and maintained by Marine Patrol personnel.



Moorings Program

In 2008, the legislature created a petition process where waterbodies other than the six covered by statute (at the time) could petition the Department of Safety, and after a hearing, become part of the <u>regulated</u> mooring program.



Moorings Program

The lakes where moorings permits are currently required are as follows:

 Winnipesaukee 	 Ossipee
•Winnisquam	 Newfound
•Squam	 Sunapee
 Pleasant Lake, (Deerfield/Northwood) 	•Bow

Moorings Program

In 2022 there were:

- 5,368 permitted moorings
- 2,620 decals were issued
- 128 new mooring applications




Automatic Disqualifiers:

- Used marijuana within 12 months
- **Illegally used a controlled substance**, other than marijuana within 36 months
 - Under 21 years of age at the time of use, within 24 months
- Manufactured, transported for sale, or sold a controlled substance
- Been dishonorably discharged from military service
- Been convicted of a misdemeanor

- involving dishonesty, unlawful sexual conduct, physical violence, controlled substances, moral turpitude, or any offense which would cause a reasonable person to doubt the applicant's character, honesty, or



ability.
